



MUSIC 104 – ROCK MUSIC HISTORY AND APPRECIATION (49787)

CLASS MEETING TIME: Mondays, 6:30 to 9:40 pm (SCC A-209)

REQUIRED TEXT: “Rock Music Styles, 7th ed.” by Katherine Charlton

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Music 104 (Rock Music History and Appreciation) is a Historical survey of rock music from its beginnings in the early 50’s to the present. Rhythm & Blues, Rockabilly, the British Invasion, Motown, Soul, Folk Rock, Hard Rock, Punk, Heavy Metal, and various Alternative Rock styles will be discussed. Personalities and musical styles will be related to the sociology of the time period being studied.

CLASS REQUIREMENTS: You must attend all class meetings on time and do all of the assigned reading and assignments. In addition to two examinations, you are required to attend one (1) “rock/pop” performance or the Grammy Museum and write a report, as well as keep a music blog. We will discuss these requirements in further detail in class.
